This event marked a significant milestone for the College and the University's joint endeavor to advance the English language, which, according to Dr. Rosario, the keynote speaker, "is a tool to spread the Gospel to all the world."

The CELL has created a wonderful learning atmosphere for students, where they help each other understand the courses taught by competent teachers. Nine students from the Chinese Adventist Seminary are currently enrolled. One of them shared how the class is "relaxed without tension or pressure."





SSO Faculty Facilitates in PADS

Run Tayaben, the administrative assistant for Student Service Office and Behavioral Management officer, served as a resource person and one of the facilitators during the "Workshop on the Development of Drug-free Learning Institutions-NCR Cluster" for the Philippine Anti-illegal Drug Strategies (PADS) on August 10-11, 2023 at the CHED Auditorium, University of the Philippines-Diliman, Quezon City. The workshop is a project for the continuous improvement of the Drug Education and Prevention Programs and for the continued efforts to strengthen the anti-illegal drug campaign in the country through higher education institutions (HEIs), a project initiative of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) in s partnership with the Dangerous Drugs Board (DDB).

Tayaben was one of the six facilitators who facilitated in the discussions on the current practices, experiences, and challenges in implementing drug education and prevention programs in HEIs. The delegates were student services personnel and guidance counselors.

Tayaben's involvement provided an opportunity to promote the University's Adventist healthy lifestyle and practices. "It is an honor to be part of this program of



PADS and work hand in hand with CHED and DDB, wherein we can shed light as an Adventist institution among the higher education sector," he explained. He highlighted how the workshops conducted were also committed to developing preventative education on alcohol, smoking, and other substances.

Previously, the workshops were held on June 6-8 in Tagaytay, June 26-28 in Davao, July 19-21 in Iloilo, and August 10-11 at the CHED auditorium, where Tayaben received a certificate of recognition. The last workshop will be on September 13-15 in Pampanga.

Over 400 First-Year Students Attend Campus Orientation and Tour

Four hundred ten incoming first-year students attended the "Explorientation," an orientation and campus tour program held on August 4, 2023, at the Philippine International Church. The program was a collaboration of the AUP Guidance Services Center and the Central Student Council.

VP academics Dr. Gracel Ann Saban, the devotional speaker, underscored the importance of prioritizing biblical values over material success for successful student life. She emphasized placing God at the forefront of their endeavors for God has promised that "all these things shall be added."





She also asked students to reflect on why God had brought them to the University. Three students shared their answers. Gina Regencia, a first-year College of Education student, expressed, "I believe God has led me here to explore and develop myself and turn this opportunity into a silver lining for my future." Another student, who had been an overseas Filipino worker for 12 years, shared, "God's mission has enabled me to resume my studies." Deo Jenson Fabriquel, a first-year Medical Laboratory Science student, shared that he is not yet certain of the reason but testified, "I have to trust in God, and He will lead the way."

Afterward, a panel discussion offered valuable information about the services provided by the University. Winfred

explained their services, which extended beyond enrollment and admissions, encompassing certification of grades, grade-related tasks, scholarships, shifting and transferring, transcripts, and foreign assistance.

The Student Finance director, Mervyn Allan Olarte, highlighted University scholarships, discounts, and payment options for financial assessments. Jun Tayaben, the Behavior Management officer, briefed students on adhering to the Student Handbook's behavioral guidelines. He also explained the process for addressing rule violations.

Pastor Lani Esteves, the Spiritual Development director and PIC senior pastor, encouraged students to engage in University and church-related religious activities. Noemi Fajardo, the Guidance Services director, welcomed students to visit the Guidance Office for mental health support and psychological tests. Dr. Isabelo Susado, Work Education Program coordinator, introduced the importance of Work Education in preparing students for service.

Dr. Julio Amurao, Vice President for Student Services, continued the orientation for parents while the students embarked on a campus tour. Led by Central Student Council representatives and 19 student guides, the first-year students, divided into four color-coded clusters, toured around the campus.



AUP Dedicates Faculty and Staff

The Adventist University of the Philippines held a dedication service for its faculty and staff on August 4-5, 2023 at the University gymnasium. Dr. Richard Sabuin, the associate director of the General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventists, served as the keynote speaker.

"We have a distinctive purpose for Adventist education," Dr. Sabuin remarked during the vespers service. He underlined the unique role of Adventist education in the remnant church. He emphasized its significance in the context of the Great Controversy. He stressed the need for Adventist education to be distinctive, intentional, and creative. The event also featured testimonies of Mrs. Hennie Felix, the administrative secretary for the vice president of student services; Mr. Moises Olarte, Academy faculty; and Mrs. Meriam Torres, Elementary faculty. They shared stories of their personal journeys, ministries, and the blessings they received as they performed their roles in the University.

During the Sabbath morning session, Pastor Sabuin continued to expound on the theme of comprehensive faith-based education. He discussed integrating faith values into learning, emphasizing that it should permeate all aspects of the institution's life, from curriculum and teaching to facilities and policies. "We are not only talking about when we are teaching one course; integration of faith and learning should be a whole campus life," he stated. Pastor Sabuin also touched upon important topics such as "The Great Commission and Adventist Education", "Abana, Pharpar, and Jordan", and "Laodicea and Adventist Education."

The event provided an opportunity for the faculty and staff from the various departments to reflect on the principles of Adventist education and draw insights from the discussions. The gathering concluded with inspiring testimonies from Ferdinand Mendoza, a Medical Laboratory Science Department faculty; Dr. Demuel Dee Berto, a College of Medicine faculty; and Erjelyn Dela Cruz, an Academy faculty. They shared their experiences and dedication to the mission of Adventist education.









PIC Celebrates Its 42nd Anniversary and the 160th Anniversary of the SDA Church

With the theme song "Go, go, go, I will go! I'm chosen for mission to go "the Dill" for mission to go," the Philippine International Church united in celebration of the 160th Anniversary of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and the 42nd Anniversary of the Philippine International Church on August 11-12, 2023.

Testimonies of Faith

During the vespers on the 11th, Adventist Church pioneers' faith was highlighted. The worship commemorated the pioneers who came to the Philippines, including George Irwin, Robert and Mary Caldwell, Edward Gates, James

McElhany, Lewis, and Ella Finster. Their stories were shared to honor their contributions.

Two church members shared their testimonies of conversion and spiritual growth. Dr. Samuel Berto shared his testimony on the impact of the faith of his parents and of the evangelistic activities of the University during the early years. "One of my most inspiring pioneering experiences here in PUC was the robust small group missionary activities," he recalled his ministries as a member of the HAPPY Family (then Villager's Group) small group. He reminisced how the small groups conducted visitations, Branch Sabbath School, and outreach programs in the neighboring barangay communities. He challenged the small groups to continue serving the Church vibrantly.

Dr. Doris Mendoza recounted her journey as a non-Adventist professor to her eventual conversion to the Adventist Church. The beginning of her enlightenment occurred when she witnessed the students at the College of Medicine at West Visayas State University in Iloilo City demonstrate their faith and devotion by refraining from attending classes, exams, and academic events on the Sabbath. As their professor, she defended their actions during board meetings, declaring, "If I were in the same situation, and I believe what they believe, then I would follow my God rather than men." And with God's leading, she served as a witness in the health ministry as the founding dean of the first medical school in the Southeast Asia Pacific Division---the AUP College of Medicine.

Refocus on the Mission

During the Sabbath School program, Pastor Francis

Gayoba presented the Adventist heritage by sharing the story of William Miller and his contributions to Adventist history. Before the divine service, two precious souls were baptized. "We have a

Twelve teams with three members participated in the quiz. Pastor Felixian Felicitas and Pastor Restituto Bualoy served as judges.

The following winners emerged in the Adventist History Quiz Bowl: Team 3— Johnre Gabo, Dylan, and Lara Albano garnered first place. Team 2—Jonas Ranas, Mark J Garao, and Eric Olivares placed second. And Team 6—Onyx Daquila, Charol Manlolo, and Eres Baybay placed third.

The winners were honored with copies of Kindle books Hearts of Faith: How We Became Seventh-day Adventists, A Living Sacrifice: Unsung Heroes of Adventist Missions by David Trim,

and A Brief History of Seventh-day Adventists by George Knight.

Celebrating the 160th anniversary of the Seventh-day Adventist Church marked a significant milestone in the journey of faith, acknowledging the past, and embracing the future with renewed zeal.

"Our whole goal was to educate, inspire, and challenge the church," Pastor Francis Gayoba, one of the PIC associate pastors, expressed. He added that it helped church members "learn some things they have not learned before." CON Caregiving Program Students Pass NC II Assessment

T en students of the Caregiving NC II program of the College of Nursing achieved a 100% passing rate for the healthcare assessment held on August 8, 2023 at the Cavite School of St. Mark Assessment Center.

Under the supervision of Mrs. Marilou Maalihan, these 10 students successfully passed their second assessment, proving their competency. These students previously underwent the Caregiving NC II certification assessment on July 28, 2023, at the same assessment center, and also received a 100% passing rate with a "competent" remark from the assessors.

Since 2004, the Caregiving NC II program of the College of Nursing has been providing healthcare education with a 100% compliance rating. The TESDA NCR auditors gave the same compliance rating last June 2, 2023.

CAH Strengthens International Extension Programs in Thailand by Hannah Ariellebeth Cabisada

The Adventist University of the Philippines-College of Arts and Humanities, in collaboration with the Community Extension Services (CES), held cultural immersion and international extension programs from August 8 to 12, 2023, in diverse locations in Thailand. Spearheaded by Dr. Eunice Aclan, the College dean, and Mrs. Eunice Carpizo, the CES director, a group of 8 students accompanied by Dr. Myrtle Grijalvo, Psychology Department chair, and Ann Anolin, Tradigital Fine Arts Department chair, empowered communities through education and health, and providing other means of support.

On the 8th of August, the group visited the King Mongkut of Technology Thonburi School of Architecture and Design (SoA+D) in Bangkok. Mr. Michael Paripol Tangtrongchit, School of Architecture and Design dean, welcomed the University team. Opening a new perspective on structural modernity and advancement of technological living through the arts, the team signed a Memorandum of Agreement for the faculty and students exchange program with SoA+D initiated in collaboration with the University's Fine Arts Department.

Wanting to immerse in the culture of Thailand, the group visited historical ruins and temples that hold significant historical and cultural importance in the city of Ayutthaya. including the Bang Pa-in and Wat Arun temples, on the 9th of August. The team deepened their cultural experience and enjoyed traditional food at the Michelincertified floating restaurant Ton Nam.

All activities were undertaken to immerse the team in the Thai culture, including the cultural significance of Thailand's landmarks, cuisine, and people. This preparation was in anticipation of their CES mission on August 10-12, 2023.

Maelah Klo Christian School - Empowering through **Education and Health**

With an unwavering commitment to empowerment. the team orchestrated a series of activities at Maelakloh Christian School in Mae Sot. Thailand. This school serves as a refuge for students predominantly from internallydisplaced families residing in Thailand's border regions. As part of the team's endeavors, Grade 4, 5, and 6 students at Maelah Klo Christian School received flute recorder tutorials, enabling them to showcase their musical learning. Prioritizing oral health, the team gave the Grades 1, 2, and 3 pupils a dental hygiene lecture and complimentary toothbrushes and toothpaste. The Grades 4, 5, and 6 girls learned creative skills in broochmaking. Furthermore, psychological assessments and interventions were conducted to aid students in coping with the trauma. English tutorial sessions and values education programs underscored the team's commitment to comprehensive growth.





Nang Bo Den Learning Centre—Fostering Development through Psychological Intervention

The team conducted a psychological assessment and intervention at the Nang Bo Den Learning Centre to cater to specific community needs. This center caters to approximately 158 orphaned students, all members of displaced families from Myanmar seeking refuge in Thailand. Guidance and counseling skills were provided to empower teachers in dealing with student behavioral challenges. Additionally, observations and interviews were conducted to inform future development campaigns aligned with these challenges.

Sunshine Orchard Camp - Nurturing Hope and Resilience

Demonstrating continued service dedication, the team distributed food supplies initiated by the Sunshine Orchard. This initiative aims to alleviate immediate needs and instill hope among refugees. Through collaborative efforts and a spirit of compassion, the initiative has significantly enhanced the lives of displaced people.

Memoranda of Agreement (MOAs) were signed at Nang Bo Den Learning Centre and Maela Klo Christian School, outlining further intervention and extension programs. In a similar effort, Pastor Kalu Hser Paul, the Director of Education and Health at the Western Border Attached Mission signed the MOA with the University for future partnership initiatives.

Beyond geographical borders, the international extension program of the University has ignited a collective spirit of education and health aimed at uplifting lives and inspiring lasting change in diverse regions of Thailand.





CAH-Psychology Department Achieves 100% **Passing Rate In BLEPP**

In the August 2023 Board Licensure Examination for Professional Psychologists, the College of Arts and Humanities Psychology Department achieved a 100% passing rate for the first takers, with an 88.89% overall performance rate against the 73.27% national passing

Realizing this significant milestone, some of the new psychologists shared testimonies about their journey. "The learning unselfishly shared by our professors paved the way for a stronger foundation as I enrolled in my Ph.D. and ultimately the Psychology Licensure Exam," Divine Margallo, one of the passers, shared, "Always start your review with a prayer and seek His wisdom. Just like what AUP had been doing; we always started with a prayer." She "always reached out to God" when she doubted herself. so grateful that our mentors are so caring. They guided us through just like a parent's tough love. They would let us explore and discover more."

"This dream had been a challenging one," Ethel Amboy, another passer, shared how she encountered numerous highs and lows, shedding tears and experiencing moments of despair. Yet, she overcame because "God has instilled in my heart to continue to serve as a driving force, compelling me to persevere." She recognized the pressing need for mental health support. This awareness reinforced her conviction to "become a psychologist dedicated to serving Christ and humanity."

The College of Arts and Humanities Psychology lacksquare Department surpassed the national passing rate of 73.27% with an overall passing rate of 87.88% and achieved a passing rate of 87.5% for first-time takers in the August 2023 Psychometricians Licensure Examination.

In gratitude for this achievement, some students shared how God blessed their efforts to prepare for the examination. Genlee Villanueva, one of the new psychometricians, reflected on how God placed her in situations where she realized He wouldn't abandon her. Pres. Rosario attends the EDCOM 2 Consultative Meeting

Dr. Arceli H. Rosario, AUP president, participated in the Second Congressional Commission on Education (EDCOM 2) Consultative Meeting at the Hotel Benilde Maison de La Salle on August 29, 2023. The EDCOM 2 is a national commission tasked to undertake a comprehensive national assessment and evaluation of the performance of the education sector. It is composed of lawmakers from both the Senate and House of Representatives, guided by an Advisory Council, and assisted by the Technical Secretariat, under the direction of Executive Director Dr. Karol Mark Yee.

The consultative meeting was a roundtable discussion with the Coordinating Council for Private Educational Associations (COCOPEA), which involved officers and representatives from Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities (PACU), Catholic Educational Association of the Philippines (CEAP), Philippine Association of Private



Schools, Colleges, and Universities (PAPSCU), and the Association of Christian Schools, Colleges, and Universities (ACSCU) of which Dr. Rosario was one of the three representatives.

The roundtable discussion focused on the horizontal and the vertical typology of higher education institutions, the Tertiary Education Subsidy, and the Voucher System. It was facilitated by Dr. Cynch Bautista and Dr. Karol Mark Yee.
