



AUP Celebrates its 107th Founding Anniversary

he Adventist University of the Philippines celebrated its 107th founding anniversary from January 26-February 4, 2024 with the theme, "Advancing, Uplifting, Persevering: Mission Driven@107."

The University's enduring commitment to advancing knowledge, uplifting communities, and persevering in its pursuit of excellence was reflected during the weeklong celebration, which included various activities.

Community Extension Services and Clean-Up Drive

Led by the Community Extensions Services Department, the University extended its services to the community of Puting Kahoy, Silang, Cavite, from January 26-30, 2024.

The "Plant and Grow" project of the College of Arts and Humanities-National Service Training Program students helped the residents of Heritage to plant 110 fruit-bearing trees. The College of Business conducted a candle-making demonstration



under skills development training for unemployed women of Barangay Kawayanan. They also conducted an entrepreneurship seminar on how to start a business, cost accounting, and marketing strategies. The College of Dentistry conducted a dental mission at Puting Kahoy Elementary School with 91 beneficiaries. The Medical Laboratory Science Department faculty and students conducted a diagnostic

test by administering FBS, urinalysis, and total cholesterol tests among the senior citizens at the Barangay Health Center with 84 beneficiaries. The College of Nursing conducted a breastfeeding seminar among 13 pregnant and lactating women. They also conducted a blood pressure screening with 75 beneficiaries. Simultaneously, the University held a clean-up drive by students, faculty, and staff.

Parade and Palaro ng Lahi Open the Week-long Celebration



The opening program commenced at the Grandstand Soccer Field on January 28. The celebration started at 6 a.m. with an in-campus parade from Roda's Park to the University grandstand. Simultaneously, the faculty and staff paraded their colorful and creative floats from the University gate to Paseo, then to Imperial, and back to the University grandstand. The soccer field was packed with students, alumni, faculty, and staff.

Dr. Joyosthie Orbe, Graduate Nursing chair and the AUP National Alumni president, in her devotional message, invited the Lord's presence. Dr. Gracel Ann Saban, vice president for academics, declared the opening of the foundation celebration. Mrs. Aileenmae Silverio, vice president for finance, lit the cauldron with fire to symbolize the official start of the week-long event.

To immortalize the celebration, the University community formed "AUP107" for a drone shot.

This year, the AUP Dormitory Circle Palaro ng Lahi opened its traditional event to off-campus and non-dormitory occupants. These traditional Filipino games include "It's More Fun in the Philippines," "Bato-Bato Pick," "Basag Palayok," "Lakad sa Pilapil," and "Palosebo."

Located at the front of the University gymnasium, the fair ran from 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. Organized by the Central Student Council, the fair created a supportive and interconnected community hub where students could explore and join religious organizations, professional groups, student associations, and music groups. The student organizations that participated were the following: Anchors, Touching Lives, Discovery, Ministerial Association, Sinai, Maranatha, Senior Youth Leaders, Campus Youth Ministry, Student Association of Literature Evangelists, Unceasing Cantica, Music Society of Nurses, Light Plays, Red Cross Youth, Analysts of Body Constituents and Diseases Club, University Voice, Off-Campus Student Association, and International Student Association. "What we want to achieve this year is that all existing organizations will be revived, and all those new organizations will be introduced to the students," Fely Rose Boquida, CSC vice president, expressed. "We wanted everybody to feel that they belong."

The CSC-Academics and Research Council

added a creative event to the fair by displaying artboards where students could paint freely. A photo highlight board and an open mic were also stationed in the area for students to showcase their creative expressions.

National Bible Day Celebration: A Sanctuary Experience

The University, led by the College of Theology-Young Ministers' Club, celebrated the National Bible Day through the sanctuary experience. The exhibit opened on January 29-February 1, 2024, at COT Room 4. It included a Bible quiz bee. For visitors and students, the sanctuary experience was a replica of the Old Testament sanctuary with three divisions: Outer Court, Holy Place, and Most Holy Place. The attendees toured inside and learned about the altar of burnt offering, laver, table of shewbread, seven candlesticks, the altar of incense, and the ark of the covenant.

Reinhart Jan Fadriquela, a psychology student, testified that he saw the significance of the sanctuary and the intercession during the Israelites as a means of "how [they] communed with God."

State of the University Address: Sharing Mission-driven Goals and Successes

"Today, we reiterate our dream. We dream of a university that is rooted in its mission, shared values, and time-honored traditions but is open to embrace change," Dr. Arceli Rosario emphasized during the State of the University Address on February 1, 2024, at 8 a.m. at the



Philippine International Church.

NPUC Director Pastor Gerardo Cajobe remarked that the University has been a pillar of knowledge for 107 years. Amidst setbacks, "our unwavering mission-driven approach has helped us advance, uplift, and persevere throughout the journey—a journey with Christ." Further fulfilling the University's mission, he reiterated the need to "put God first in everything."

Dr. Rosario meticulously outlined the University's accomplishments from January 2023 to December 2023 through the six strategic goals. These goals encompassed Transforming Spirituality, Excellence in Teaching and Learning, Committed Christian Service and Ministry, Excellent Organizational Stewardship, Qualified and Committed Personnel, and Effective Institutional Relations. "We dream of a supportive and nurturing community," she highlighted her vision for this year's term.

"This year, we will start the construction of the teaching hospital." She shared plans for facilities expansion including the proposed construction of the Student Association Literature Evangelist building and a Hope Channel compound in the University in partnership with NPUC.

Dr. Rosario concluded with a prayer, recognizing God as the ultimate source of the University's success: "The Lord God Almighty is God over AUP!"

In gratefulness for the University's journey, the celebration recognized the contribution of the pioneers. Dr. Rosario; Dr. Sheryll Ann Castillo, Guidance Services director; and Mr. Jeruel Ibañez, History Department faculty, shared a presentation of their study (with Dr. Jesse Songcayawon) entitled "Alfonso Roda as PUC President: A Portraiture." Using the portraiture research design, a type of

narrative inquiry, the study explored the leadership of Dr. Roda, the 9th AUP president. Dr. Castillo concluded: "Leaders who live for others and their institution are those whose influence endures. They are transformational, servant leaders with personal humility and professional will."

A mural painting for the University called "Invisible Visible of God's Love for Us" by Mr. Merick Eupalao, Fine Arts Department faculty, was unveiled. Inspired by Jeremiah 17:7, 8, the artwork delved into the remarkable intervention of both seen and unseen miracles of God's love to AUP. The faces of the past and present presidents epitomize mission-driven leadership, empowered by God for advancement and resilience.



The University awarded four distinguished individuals for their mission-driven accomplishments: Pastor Benjamin Martin, Distinguished Service Award; Dr. Edna Domingo, Distinguished Service Award in the Nursing Profession; Dr. Eppie Manalo, Distinguished Achievement in Service to the University; and Angela Manalo-Lalas, honoris causa for Doctor of Business Administration.

NPUC Education Director Dr. Mary Jane Zabat expressed how the University set the stage for Adventist schools' growth and played a great role in advancing God's mission through Adventist education. She urged AUP to "reach for the highest goals so the world will know God lives in you and with you. Onward, dear AUP. Shine on forever!"

University Inaugurates CAH Building

The University inaugurated the AWESNA—Alfonso P. Miguel, Jr. building on February 1, 2024, at 1:30 p.m. Dr. Michael Naidas, dean of the College of Arts and Humanities, welcomed the benefactors, students, faculty,

Jesus calls us beyond our capacity, beyond our comfort, beyond our current faith to trust in Him," Pastor Lee Venden emphasized, igniting the spirit of introspection and renewal at the Faculty and Staff Spiritual Retreat 2024. Held at the University Gymnasium on February 9-10, 2024, the retreat resonated with the theme "A Calling Beyond Us" as participants embarked on a transformative journey guided by Pastor Venden, the guest resource speaker from the United States and accompanied by the melodies of guest singers and musicians Jennifer LaMountain, Michael Andrews, and Steve Darmody.

Drawing from his experiences and biblical teachings, Pastor Venden emphasized the transformative power of remembering who

is in control and placing unwavering faith in God's plan.

On February 9, during the vesper service, Pastor Venden urged attendees to reflect on their journeys of faith, emphasizing the omnipresent nature of God's guidance even in the face of adversity. "There can be times when trusting Him may seem harder than other times," Pastor Venden stated, emphasizing challenges where God is at work in the lives of His children, primarily through difficult moments.

Reflecting on the message, the faculty and staff had a group discussion. They shared how they have seen God in their work and how their experience of suffering can be used to better fulfill God's calling.

On February 10, the Sabbath school service commenced with testimonies from Mrs. Maureen Mariñas and Pastor Noel Mariñas. They highlighted their journey of relocation to AUP as a divine calling. "When God calls us out of our comfort zones, He leads us to a better and more fulfilling place of comfort," Maureen Mariñas expressed. Moreover, amidst adjustments and challenges, Pastor Noel Mariñas testified, "If God calls, He provides."

Pastor Venden continued his presentation, delving into the theme of remembrance, urging faculty and staff to reflect on God's faithfulness throughout their respective journeys. Drawing parallels between biblical narratives and personal anecdotes, "Last minute God comes through and then puts us in the next position He has intended for us," Pastor Venden emphasized the importance of staying attuned to God's guiding hand amidst life's uncertainties. Then, Jennifer LaMountain concluded the message with her song, "All Along," as an appeal.

In the context of Jesus' crucifixion, Pastor Venden centered his message during the hour of worship on Jesus' prayer journey in the garden of Gethsemane. Relating to the plan of salvation to the world, He portrayed


The CAH Student Council led the celebration with a foot and float parade inside the campus. A series of events took place at the Finster Hall of All Nations. The Council
