AUP President Arceli Rosario Empowers Students in Their Academic and Personal Journey With Eight Tips

here are you going?""How do you get there?"These were the two questions AUP President Dr. Arceli Rosario centered her message on during the students' convocation in the Philippine International Church on January 12, 2024.

She believed that each student, faculty, and staff was "God's miracle to AUP," emphasizing this point with stories on how God had brought them to the university.

Using the flight metaphor, she shared eight insightful tips on how to navigate through academic and personal journeys with God's leading:

First, she urged them to "know where you are going." She emphasized reflective thinking, having calculated steps towards one's purpose, and avoiding suroy-suroy, a Bisaya word which is translated as "wandering around."

Second, President Rosario urged students to "take action" toward their aspirations. In context, she used tabok, a Bisaya word for "to cross," to illustrate how one should get to a destination. "How do I get there? Simple. Cross. *Tabok...*. Do you want to be a medical doctor? Tabok. Come to AUP and enroll. Do you want to be an IT? Tabok. Come to AUP and enroll."

Third, "get to the right terminal." President Rosario stressed the importance of discernment which will guide students to reach their intended destinations.

Fourth, "be prepared for surprises." President Rosario encouraged students to embrace unexpected twists and turns as opportunities for growth and resilience. "Enjoy detours. Delays can be a blessing. Cancellations can be blessings in disguise," she remarked.

Fifth, she emphasized not shoving one's way because "you have a reserved seat."

Sixth, she shared how one should make the journey a pleasant experience not only for oneself but also for others.

"You may experience turbulent times during your stay here at AUP, but do not be afraid. You are in safe hands, and the Lord will see you through." She reminded all of their capacity to overcome challenges with faith and perseverance: "You will get through the turbulence."

6 COD Graduates Passed the Licensure Examination for Dentists

Six College of Dentistry graduates passed the November 2023 Licensure Examinations for Dentists. The board results were released by the Professional Regulatory Commission on January 17, 2024. In this two-part examination—with the written phase held on November 28–30, 2023 and the practical phase on January 4–11, 2024—the College of Dentistry achieved a remarkable 71.43% passing rate for first-time takers against the 43.88% national passing rate.

These six doctors are Dr. Joenel Gem Alvarico, Dr. Kyle Cyra Contreras, Dr. Jerick Ludfred Falculan, Dr. Nelison John Fofue, Dr. Zion Tagle Ilagan, and Dr. Gold Lemon Perigo.

Exemplifying excellence in dentistry, some of the passers shared their journey:

"Someone told me that the board exam is 99% faith and 1% knowledge. I can attest that it truly tested my faith. During the exam, I imagined Jesus sitting beside me as if we were tackling each question together. Our exam was a 7-hour practical test, which proved to be my most challenging yet beautiful moment with Jesus.... That 7-hour exam was like a summary of my 8 years in dental school. While my first 2 years were marked by confidence and excitement, the subsequent years were full of doubts about my ability to succeed and questioning if dentistry was my true calling. Yet, here I am, by God's grace. I was able to finish dentistry and am now a licensed dentist, a dream I fervently prayed for and relentlessly

pursued. I remained steadfast in my faith, trusting in God's promises until they were fulfilled. I am a living fulfillment of that prayer—a licensed dentist." —Dr. Kyle Cyra Contreras

"During my review days, I always lacked confidence that I would pass the board exams due to my academic standing at school. I kept on degrading myself but at the same time praying that I would pass. I told myself to give the best effort that I could give with no regrets. However, as the exam dates neared, I realized that I was praying to pass the boards while doubting God and myself. During the theoretical exam, my prayer was always, 'Lord, I lay it all to you. Kayo na po'ng bahala s'akin (Please take charge of me).'Then the practical phase came and I thought it would be more bearable than the written phase, but I was wrong because I made mistakes in all five exams. And they were very obvious ones. After that, each day that passed felt very heavy and regrets weighed on me. Then I remembered my previous realization: 'Pray and BELIEVE.' So, each day I'd say, 'I did my best; God will do the rest.' For with God, nothing is impossible.' Luke 1:37 was my go-to verse, and God did answer my prayers. Dr. Rosario Empowers Researchers at the 8th WCQR in Johannesburg, South Africa

A UP President Dr. Arceli Rosario served as a resource speaker at the 8th Annual World Conference on Qualitative Research (WCQR) on January 23-25, 2024, in Johannesburg, South Africa. The conference program includes keynote presentations, workshops, panel discussions, parallel communications, demo sessions, networking, and cultural activities.

After the WCQR2024 opening, Dr. Rosario, the first plenary speaker, gave a keynote talk about "Dealing with Quality in Indigenous Qualitative Research."

On January 24, she did a demonstration presentation entitled "Formulating the Research Questions and the Interview Guide for Transcendental Phenomenology." This topic is part of her advocacy, which is to equip qualitative researchers, particularly in conducting phenomenological studies. During her demo presentation, she gave exercises on formulating the research questions for transcendental phenomenology given different phenomena, followed by formulating the interview guide for the phenomenological interview.

The World Conference on Qualitative Research (WCQR) is an annual event that brings together researchers, world-renowned authors, and research groups from many countries, sharing their experiences with qualitative methods and research studies using qualitative



research designs. The WCQR is one of the most relevant platforms for discussing and disseminating the best scientific production in qualitative research.

The 8th WCQR in Johannesburg was organized by the Global Research Center for Academic Research in collaboration with the WCQR based in Portugal, the South African government, and other institutions.

Dr. Rosario and her husband met with friends such as Filipino missionaries and alumni in South Africa and parents of two AUP students—Matthew Charles and Addon Lutchman. They were welcomed with a big potluck at the house of Pastor and Mrs. Charles. The Rosarios also enjoyed visits to two game reserves where they saw the Big Five—lions, elephants, buffalos, leopards, and rhinos—and many other animals. Dr. Rosario said her best treat was seeing a herd of antelopes and zebras set in a field of wild yellow flowers.
