

AUP Ranks 6th for New RMTs, Acosta Shines in Top 7



he University ranked 6th place among top-performing schools during the

March 2024 Medical Technologists
licensure examination released on March

27, 2024. The newest batch of registered medical technologists achieved a 98.31% passing rate, compared to the national passing rate of 80.6%.

Among the 58 examinees, Pittzman Jo R. Acosta, RMT, AUP-MLS Paglaum 2023, made a remarkable achievement by ranking Top 7 nationwide.

Acosta reflected on his academic experience from the pandemic until the board examinations. He stated that "studying is a holistic experience! AUP reminded me that we should never sequester ourselves. I have my classmates, family, teachers, and God to thank for. We are witnesses to His miracles. We are the testimonies of His mercies. I hope that the challenges I went through become a lesson for everyone. [This] success is a testament to how God works in us. You cannot finish a journey on your own. You need a friend, a family, and a God who shines a light on your path," Acosta concluded.

The University delegation, represented by the Student Recruitment Officer Mrs. Ardelma Sarmiento and AUP Academy Principal Ms. Janeth Bacomo, ventured to Tokyo, Japan, from February 19-23, 2024.

The trip, sponsored by Josai High School through Ms. Ayako Yamaguchi, aimed to forge meaningful linkages and explore potential exchange programs with esteemed Japanese institutions, including Josai High School, Josai Kawagoe High School, and Nihon Institute of Medical Science.

At Josai High School, Mrs. Sarmiento and Ms. Bacomo engaged in a dynamic lecture session and extended courtesy to Principal Kamisugi Munenori and English Department Chair Ami Morita. Delving into Japanese culture, they participated in a mesmerizing flower-arrangement experience called Ikebana and were welcomed with a traditional "Tea Ceremony," fostering cultural exchange.

Transitioning to Josai Kawagoe High School, Mrs. Sarmiento and Ms. Bacomo gave lectures alongside Principal Satoshi Watanabe. A guided tour around Kawagoe offered insights into local heritage, culminating in a captivating cultural drum presentation, igniting a deeper appreciation for Japanese traditions.
