
### AUP Continues to Shine in August 2024 Licensure Examinations Ones at all trans-to avenue.

The Adventist University of the Philippines (AUP) continued to shine with outstanding performances in four August 2024 licensure examinations.

The Graduate Psychology Department achieved an impressive



82.35% passing rate for first-time takers with an overall performance rate of 77.78% in the Psychologists Licensure Examination. It excelled with a 100% overall performance, significantly surpassing the national passing rate of 58.63% in the Guidance Counselor Licensure Examination.

Additionally, the Psychology Department attained remarkable results in the Psychometrician Licensure Examination, with an 87.5% passing rate for first-time takers and an overall



performance rate of 85.29% above the national passing rate of 69.78%.

The Medical Laboratory Science program also excelled, achieving a 100% passing rate for first-time takers and an overall passing rate of



96.15% in the Medical Technologist Licensure Examination, compared to the national passing rate of 69.47%.

With these achievements, focusing on academic excellence, Christ-like character, and exemplary service, AUP continues to set the bar high, underscoring its achievements in Adventist education and its dedication to nurturing top-tier professionals in various fields.

# Dr. Ranko Stefanovic Enlightens the AUP community through Spiritual Refresher Week

The Philippine International Church recently concluded a spiritually enriching event, the Spiritual Refresher Week, held from August 12-17. The week-long series featured esteemed guest speaker Dr. Ranko Stefanovic, a prominent theologian and biblical scholar renowned for his expertise in the book of Revelation.

Dr. Stefanovic, a professor at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University, captivated audiences with his profound insights into the Bible. His extensive work, particularly his acclaimed commentary "Revelation of Jesus Christ: Commentary on the Book of Revelation," has solidified his reputation as a leading scholar in New Testament studies.

Throughout the week, Dr. Stefanovic delivered a series of compelling lectures on pivotal topics, including: "From Eden to Jerusalem," "What the Bible Teaches About Sin," "The Lion and the Lamb," "What the Bible Teaches About Salvation," "God Can Save and Change Human Beings," and "Satan is a Defeated Enemy."

Dr. Stefanovic's lectures on "From Eden to Jerusalem" and "The Lion and the Lamb" gave attendees a deep and comprehensive understanding of biblical themes. These insights enhanced their spiritual knowledge and deepened their faith, leaving them feeling enlightened and knowledgeable.

In addition to the evening presentations, Dr. Stefanovic engaged with the academic community through a special lecture on "The Symbolism of Biblical Revelation" for the College of Theology professors and students on August 16, 2024.

### Faculty and Staff Begins with God for Academic Year 2024-2025

During the Sabbath, the Faculty and Staff Dedication worship was



held at the Philippine International Church on August 17, 2024. The service was attended by 272 faculty and staff.

AUP President Dr. Arceli Rosario, during her welcoming remarks, urged the faculty and staff to "begin with God" as they embark on the new academic year. He encouraged the faculty and staff to reflect on the divine choice of their positions, despite their own feelings of unworthiness, asserting that God sees potential in them that they might not recognize in themselves.

"God chose you," he affirmed, urging them to embrace their roles with the mission of impacting students' lives profoundly. Dr.

Stefanovic concluded with a heartfelt plea for divine guidance in making their work effective in reaching the students' hearts, with the ultimate goal of seeing them "one day in the Kingdom of God." His words underscored the dedication not just to educational excellence but to the spiritual and eternal well-being of their students.

Three students accepted Jesus Chtist as their personal Savior at the end of the Spiritual Refreshment Week.


Didasko is a Greek word that translates "to teach and to serve" which Jesus used when He gave the Great Commission in Matthew 28:20.

"Start with what you have, grow where you have planted, love teaching, and enjoy the journey," she added.

As the program continued, Ms. Princess Castillo and Mr. Carl Hero, two COE alumni, further motivated the Didasko Batch as they sailed on the rough yet exciting journey. The alumni's testimonials were a testament to God's goodness, full of gratitude and a growth mindset.

### Thanksgiving Dinner for Sola Gratia Chorale: A Night of Gratitude and Reflection

A heartfelt thanksgiving dinner, sponsored by the University Administration, was held at the Finster Hall of All Nations on August 10, 2024, to honor the Sola Gratia Chorale's recent victory at the 8th Singapore International Chorale Festival. The evening was a celebration of gratitude and reflection of God's goodness.

The testimonies of God's grace became the emotional highlight of the evening. Some members of the Sola Gratia Chorale shared their personal stories of faith, perseverance, and divine intervention. John Almer Caagbay, the assistant conductor and a current AUP College of Medicine student, recounted his spiritual journey, marked by a series of divine signs that guided him and his fellow chorale members. "I never prayed to win," he shared, "My prayer was always for us to enjoy the experience, grow our ministry, and have a testimony to tell. Moreover, tonight, I stand before you with that testimony."

Almer's story was a testament to faith in action. He shared many signs of how God reinforced his belief in His' guidance anchored in his promises in Proverbs 3:5-6. He recounted from random encounters with scripture to providing essential needs during the trip. "It is a big faith journey *talaga.*" His narrative emphasized that while winning was a blessing, the true victory lay in the spiritual growth and experiences the chorale gained. His prayer to God was to enjoy and make the most of the experience. "We want to grow our ministry far beyond what we already do. We want to be Your representatives." He also likened their experience to the little boy with five loaves and two fishes while preparing for the festival concert. During the concert proper, he was looking forward to the 12 baskets prepared for them.

"When you ask God about something, He grants more than what we think or what we asked," he continued. "We were bidding for gold for at least 1 or 2 categories; He gave us gold in all categories. We wanted to make it to the grand prix, but God gave us more than we had asked for; he allowed us to win the grand prix. God does answer prayer."

Jove Milmarc Jimenez, a recent AUP College of Theology graduate, shared his journey with the chorale, describing how it had become a family to him and even helped his shy brother find his voice in ministry. "A lot of the older members are already working and moving on [to employment], and building the choir's momentum is really a challenge," he shared. "And Kuya Cy, our conductor, is in the States." He reflected on the challenges the chorale faced, including the difficulties of balancing work, study, and rehearsals. "Our practice will be every 6 a.m. with Kuya Cy joining us online. It is a struggle," he expressed.

Nevertheless, they remained committed to their mission through it all, trusting that God would provide the needed resources and strength. "I believe that God's mission is alive in this group," he testified with all the blessings they have received from the Lord. He also pointed out that to continue the chorale's mission, especially for their new members and opening auditions, "We want our mission to move forward."

He also mentioned how he and Almer, roommates in Singapore, worried because they would be with seasoned choirs. However, they clung to God's promises for them and gave all their worries to Him. "Wala po ni isa samin ang may experience ng choral festival (No one in our group has experience joining a choral festival)," he mentioned. "This is our first time; all we have with us is our five loaves, two fishes, and our great God. Yun lang po ang bitbit namin sa Singapore (It is the only thing we brought to Singapore)," he testified. Looking at God amidst all of their experiences, he also recalled how God provided for them. "God provided us people. God provided us









with our parents. God provided us with sponsors who can help us alleviate our financial shortcomings. God provided us with a window of time so we could rehearse. God provided us, coaches." They recalled God's blessings in Singapore, "God provided us Petrus and Pamugun." God provided them with health and safety. "If you trust God, He will set your paths straight," he concluded.

Mr. Cyril Punay, the chorale's conductor, also shared his reflections, expressing deep gratitude for the opportunity to lead such a dedicated and humble group. He shared his belief that asking God for great things is a testament to faith. He recalled how he was praying when they planned to join the festival, "if it is your will for us to join in this competition, I pray that does not fall on the Sabbath. Furthermore, that alone was a door open to me when I saw the post on the Singapore choral festival." He expressed his gratitude and awe to God to deserve everything in his life. Punay emphasized the importance of humility and collaboration in their success, thanking their mentors and supporters who had guided them along the way.

He recounted the moments of doubt and the overwhelming joy of seeing God's hand at work, particularly during the Grand Prix night. "I was rooting for another choir to win," he admitted, "but God had other plans. It was a miracle that He allowed us to win the sacred category so that we could represent Him well," he testified that their victory was a clear example of God's ability to provide beyond human comprehension. "God executed everything. God provided everything," he shared in his recollections, reminding him how God works through our doubts and fears. "God gave it to us. I know the kids enjoyed that performance. I do not know if we could do that again because it was God," he emphasized. "Our performance there was all about God's goodness and grace. He allowed us to do extremely well, which we had never experienced before."

The evening continued with an exceptional performance by the Sola Gratia Chorale, who showcased pieces from their winning repertoire: "When I Have Sung My Songs to You" by Z. Randall Stroope and "Pamugun" by Francisco Feliciano, from the Mixed Category repertoire, and "Petrus" by Z. Randall Stroope, from their grand prix entry.

AUP President Dr. Arceli Rosario praised the chorale for its significant contribution to representing Adventist education and training through music. She presented Sola Gratia and Mr. Punay with certificates of recognition, acknowledging their role in sharing a message of hope through their voices during the Singapore International Chorale Festival.
