AUPA RoboLights Emerges as Champions in Creotec 4th Robotic Competition

A UP Academy (AUPA) marked a historic achievement as Grade 7 students from the Garnet section, Serene Perdon and Zaira Fugoso, emerged as champions at the 4th Creotec MakeX Competition—Starter Category, held at Robinsons Galleria South, San Pedro, Laguna, on November 19, 2024. This triumph highlights the success of the Academy's newly-integrated robotics course in computer classes.

Under the guidance of Mr. Moises Jimenez, a junior high school computer teacher, Serene Perdon and Zaira Fugoso successfully coded command sequences, securing the top position in both the automatic and manual stages. Supported by three backup players—Johann Castillo, Eli Arce, and Von Carlo Casasis—they demonstrated that faith in God and hard work lead to triumph.

Coach Jimenez attributed their success to divine guidance: "Even with only 2 weeks of preparation, they still managed to become champions. This shows that when we submit to the guidance of God, there is nothing we cannot do."

Their victory earned them a sponsored trip for the two winners and their mentor to China, where they will represent the Philippines in the Starter Category competition, which will take place on December 4-6, 2024.

AUPA's robotics course, a new integration to the computer classes curriculum for School Year 2024-2025, equips students with foundational skills in robotics while integrating faith-based principles. The course introduces students to the fundamental concepts and skills needed to understand and work with robots while integrating faith and values. It begins with an introduction to the basics of robotics, where students learn about different types of robots and the components that make up a robotic system.

The objectives of the class include the following: (1) develop problem-solving skills and critical thinking skills through handson experience in designing, building, and

programming simple robots using kits or basic materials; (2) encourage collaboration and teamwork through group activities; (3) demonstrate the real-world application of robotics through the integration of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) concepts; (4) foster responsible innovation by discussing ethical and social considerations, in line with the biblical principle of stewardship; (5) recognize students' creativity by exploring and experimenting different ideas in robot design and programming; and (6) helps students to realize that they can reflect the image of God through innovation and creativity, as stated in Genesis 1:27.

This remarkable achievement embodies AUPA's philosophy, mission, and vision, paving the way for future innovations and inspiring students to develop their God-given potential.

PIC and ACS Extend Relief Efforts to Typhoon Khristine Victims in Lemery and Bicol

The Philippine International Church (PIC) and the Adventist Community Services (ACS) extended relief to communities affected by Typhoon Khristine through a 2-phase donation campaign. The first wave of donations took place on November 3, 2024, in Sinisian East, Lemery, Batangas, followed by a second wave on November 10, 2024, in Lemery.



For monetary donations and assistance, a total of P41,000 was raised and distributed: P32,000 for 32 families in Sinisian East, with each family receiving P1,000; P20,000 for relief efforts in Laurel, Batangas. P58,000 was endorsed to the Southern Luzon Mission for Typhoon Khristine victims in Bicol; P3,000 in financial assistance was provided to a student from Bicol; and P20,000 for a Psychological First Aid Program to support emotional recovery.

For additional support, the Central Student Council (CSC) sponsored fuel for transportation to Laurel, with expenses totaling P8,000. Pre-



loved clothing donations were also collected from the AUP community for distribution to affected families.



These efforts demonstrate the commitment of PIC, ACS, CSC, and the AUP community to support disaster-stricken areas through both financial and emotional assistance. The relief provided has helped ease the burden on affected families and individuals as they begin their recovery.

In the October 2024 Electronics Technician Licensure Examination, the University secured a 100% passing rate surpassing the national passing rate of 70.77% with Joshua Vivern Decano, a graduate of the Electronics Communication Engineering program, who exemplified AUP's commitment to excellence in education and training.

In the November 2024 Nutritionist Dietitian Licensure Examination, the University achieved an impressive 94.74% passing rate for first-time takers. This outstanding result exceeded the 69.73% national passing rate.

Reflecting the strong spiritual foundation of AUP, the University's newly registered nutritionist-dietitian passers echoed their faith, with the words of Zechariah 4:6.

"I can really testify that God has been faithful to me," Mark Louie Santiago shared his experience working while doing self-review. "God did not just prove His good plans to me but rather gave me His "best" providence."

Atty. Serrano Stresses the Importance of Digital Identity Protection

Atty. Carmine Eliza T. Serrano, data privacy officer and head of compliance of First Cabuyao Hospital and Medical Center, explored the importance of protecting one's digital identity during the Data Privacy Awareness Day celebration at the Philippine International Church on November 22, 2024. She stressed that students in the Philippines were vulnerable to online threats that



could compromise personal information and prospects.

Citing Republic Acts 10173 (Data Privacy Act), 10175 (Cybercrime Prevention Act), and 9995 (Anti-Photo and Video Voyeurism Act), Atty. Serrano shared crucial legal frameworks for data protection and online security that students must know to understand their rights and responsibilities under these laws.

According to Atty. Serrano, "Our digital identities are extensions of ourselves." She emphasized the need for careful management. For



example, a simple online search or social media post could leave a permanent digital footprint, potentially harming reputations and future opportunities. She recommended best practices for securing digital identities, including verifying sources, using unique passwords, limiting personal information online, and monitoring social media profiles.

Sponsored by the Data Privacy Office, the presentation highlighted best practices for digital identity protection and the right of University students to stay informed to mitigate risks. As Atty. Serrano concluded, "Your data is yours and is worth protecting."

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The University celebrated a historic moment with the Hope Channel Philippines (HCP) will soon rise on campus. systematic theology, biblical hermeneutics, and biblical theology. Dr. Hasel is a prolific author, contributing to works such as Biblical Hermeneutics: An Adventist Approach, where he explored modern trends in biblical interpretation. Additionally, he has served as an editor for the Seventh-day Adventist Bible and Theological Dictionary and the revised SDA Encyclopedia. With a career that spans pastoral ministry and academia—including roles as a theology professor and director of the Ellen G. White Study Center in Austria— Dr. Hasel is also noted for his works that integrate spirituality with theological scholarship, such as Living for God and Longing for God: A Prayer and Bible Journal.

Dr. Clinton Wahlen is also an associate director of the Biblical Research Institute, recognized for his expertise in New Testament studies, biblical theology, and hermeneutics. His research extends to Adventist history and the writings of Ellen G. White. Dr. Wahlen has authored significant contributions addressing the cultural relevance of Scripture and its universal principles. His scholarly work includes editing and writing for major theological publications and engaging with contemporary issues in biblical hermeneutics to provide insights aligned with Seventh-day Adventist theology. Dr. Kaiser is an Associate Professor of Church History at Andrews University Theological Seminary. He specializes in the interplay between history and theology, with particular focus on the development of Seventh-day Adventist views on divine inspiration, the

Trinity, and the doctrine of God. His research delves into the historical progression of Adventist theology, particularly Ellen G. White's role and writings. Dr. Kaiser has contributed to various scholarly works, including chapters in the Oxford Handbook of Seventh-day Adventism. His teaching portfolio includes courses like Issues in Ellen G. White Studies and History of Seventh-day Adventist Theology. Additionally, he has provided valuable insights into the historical development of Trinitarian theology within Adventism

Dr. Nunez is a respected professor at the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIIAS) in the Biblical Studies Department. His academic interests encompass the heavenly sanctuary, discipleship, mission, biblical theology, and New Testament studies, with a particular emphasis on the Pauline epistles and the Book of Hebrews. Dr. Nunez's work reflects a commitment to exploring the theological underpinnings of salvation and the broader mission of the church, providing both practical and theological insights to his students and the academic community

Belga Bags 6th Place in the 57th Shell National Art **Competition with a Tribute to the Philippine Eagle**



herlyn A. Belga, a fourthyear student from the AUP Department of Tradigital Fine Arts, has earned recognition for her exceptional work, securing 6th place in the prestigious 57th Shell National Art Competition. Her powerful piece, "Ala-ala Para Sa Isang Mangayon" (Remembering a Mangayon), has captured the attention of judges and touched the hearts

of many with its poignant message about preserving our national treasures.

The artwork, which beautifully honors the memory of the Philippine eagle named Mangayon, brought attention to the tragic fate of this majestic bird, which was found shot in July 2024 in the forests of Davao de Oro. Mangayon, a symbol of strength and pride for the Filipino people, was believed to have been shot by a "jolen gun" (marble bullet) or a real firearm. The bird, suffering from severe blood loss, sadly passed away.

Through her sculpture, Belga masterfully captures the heart-wrenching story of Mangayon, turning tragedy into a powerful call to action for the protection of the Philippine eagle—a species that is exclusively found in the Philippines and is considered a national treasure. Her artwork serves as a reminder of the delicate balance of nature and the urgent need for conservation efforts.

In her reflection, Belga expressed the inspiration behind her work, saying, "The artwork was a sculpture, and the resources I utilized to create it were marbles (Jolen) and discarded keys and doorknob parts that I gathered from the University dorms. For me, each key, is a person. They reflect the journey of the used key in opening doors," she explained the concept of combining keys, functioning as one and open up new possibilities. "The same goes for educating the

country on how Filipinos can come together [as one nation.] This piece is not just about remembering Mangayon; it is about understanding the significance of protecting our national treasures. The Philippine eagle symbolizes our nation's strength, and we must all play a part in preserving it for future generations."

The tragic story of Mangayon is not an isolated incident. With wildlife in the Philippines facing increasing threats from poaching and habitat loss, Belga's piece speaks to the larger conversation of conservation and environmental awareness. It calls on every Filipino to recognize their role in safeguarding the country's natural wonders and biodiversity.



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
