





The University celebrated another historic milestone by officially launching a penguin mascot during its 108th Founding Anniversary at the University Grandstand on February 2, 2025. This momentous occasion followed the AUP Limitless Color Run, adding vibrancy and excitement to the celebration.

A university mascot is more than just an emblem; it embodies the institution's values, unity, and school spirit. The AUP penguin signifies resilience, faithfulness, community, and adaptability—values that align with AUP's mission and vision.

The Story Behind the Penguin Mascot

The presence of penguin structures at AUP dates back to the 1990s when the structures first appeared as environment-friendly figures dedicated to keeping the campus clean. These penguin-themed trash bins donated by a student organization in the 90s, installed initially near the AUP Store, became an integral part of the University culture. The penguins had been a campus fixture since 1999, known as "environmental-friendly birds from Antarctica" who helped keep AUP clean. Over the years, they evolved from being simple "trash eaters" to becoming one of AUP's most cherished symbols, gaining prominence as permanent landmarks.







In 2016, the removal of these iconic structures left a significant void in the hearts of AUPians. Their disappearance sparked a social media outcry, and the response highlighted their significance beyond functionality—they had become part of AUP's identity.

However, the penguins were not forgotten. Recognizing their symbolic value, the AUP Advancement Office, led by Advancement Director Mr. Oemer Rey Daquila proposed making the penguin the official University mascot.

The designer is Jay Mosquera, an AUP alumnus and senior concept artist and designer at Walt Disney Studios. Mosquera played a vital role in redesigning, reimagining, and animating the mascot, bringing this beloved icon back to life.

Why Penguin?

Among various campus icons considered—including the AUP gate, the AUP Fire, and the AUP Pillars—the penguin stood out as an icon that touches the hearts of University stakeholders. Aligning with the University's core values, the penguins are known for their lifelong dedication to their mates and offspring, symbolizing the University's commitment to faith and nurturing future generations. These creatures thrive in strong, supportive communities like the AUP family, where students, faculty, and staff work together for growth and success. Penguins endure extreme environments, reflecting AUP's mission to equip students to overcome challenges in an ever-changing world. Once considered mere waste receptacles, the penguins have transformed into potent symbols of tradition, history, and identity.

AUP Among 14 Institutions Recognized for Medical Technologists' Careers in Hawaii

The Adventist University of the Philippines (AUP) stood among only 14 institutions in the Philippines recognized by the Hawaii Department of Health (HDOH) for its Medical Laboratory Science (MLS) program.

This recognition grants AUP graduates an easier pathway to employment in Hawaii's healthcare system by removing certain regulatory barriers. Alongside the University, other distinguished academic institutions included in this recognition and **Angeles University Foundation (Angeles** City, Pampanga); Cagayan State University (Tuquegarao, Cagayan); Centro Escolar University-Makati (Gil Puyat, Makati City), Centro Escolar University-Manila (Mendiola, San Miguel, Manila); Far Eastern University-Manila (Nicanor Reyes St., Sampaloc, Manila); Far Eastern University-Nicanor Reyes Medical Foundation (West Fairview, Quezon City); Lyceum of the Philippines-Batangas, Inc. (Capitol Site, Batangas City); Our Lady of

Fatima University-Quezon City (North Fairview, Quezon City); Our Lady of Fatima University-Antipolo (Sta. Cruz, Antipolo City, Rizal); Our Lady of Fatima University-Valenzuela (Marulas, Valenzuela City); Saint Louis University (Bonifacio St., Baguio City); Trinity University of Asia-Quezon City (E. Rodriguez Sr. Ave., New Manila, Quezon City); and University of Santo Tomas (Sampaloc, Manila).

This recognition stemmed from the renewed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) and HDOH which establishes the qualifications for Filipino Registered Medical Technologists (RMTs) seeking licensure and employment in Hawaii. Previously, under Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) 11-110.1-26, applicants for a medical technologist license were required to complete 1 year of full-time experience as a medical

laboratory technician in an HDOH-approved clinical laboratory. However, under the new agreement, this requirement will now be waived for applicants who meet the following criteria: they must hold a bachelor's degree in medical technology from an institution recognized and accepted by HDOH; have completed an internship program from a governmentaccredited training laboratory affiliated with a recognized institution; be licensed as a medical technologist in the Philippines; and have at least two years of full-time work experience in a tertiary-level, hospital-based clinical laboratory licensed by the Philippine Government.

In addition, PRC has specified that only applicants who graduated within the last 5 to 10 years from a recognized institution are eligible to apply under this agreement. This development further strengthens the global career prospects of AUP graduates,

reinforcing the University's commitment to producing highly skilled professionals in the field of medical laboratory science. The agreement is a significant step in making the licensing process smoother and more accessible for qualified Filipino medical technologists aspiring to work in Hawaii.

The renewal of this MOU will remain in effect for 5 years unless extended or terminated earlier by both parties. This milestone underscores AUP's dedication to world-class education and training, equipping students with the skills necessary to thrive in the global healthcare industry. With this recognition, AUP-RMT graduates can look forward to greater international career opportunities, making their journey toward a future in healthcare more seamless and rewarding.

Academic Team Presents 616 Senior Candidates for Graduation

You are almost there, and this is our way of saying 'give it a dash!' Affirm to yourself that you will let the story find its ending during your graduation, for the Lord has been with you, and He will carry you through," AUP President Dr. Arceli Rosario welcomed the graduating candidates during the seniors' presentation at the Philippine International Church on February 21, 2025.

Six hundred sixteen seniors were presented: 97 (70 undergraduate, 27 graduate) from the College of Arts & Humanities, 116 (79 undergraduate, 37 graduate) from the College of Business, 58 from the College of Dentistry, 34 (23 undergraduate, 11 graduate) from the College of Education, 117 (82 undergraduate, 25 graduate) from the College of Health, 28 from the College of Medicine, 111 (105 undergraduate, 6 graduate) from the College of Nursing, 30 from the College of Science & Technology, and 25 from the College of Theology.

AWESNA Medical Mission 2025 Serves in Bukidnon

The PUC-AUP Alumni of Western North America (AWESNA) conducted a medical mission 2025 at Valencia City, Bukidnon from February 19-22, 2025, bringing together volunteers from the USA and the Philippines to provide healthcare, outreach, and community support. With a spirit of service and generosity, the mission reached thousands of people, offering medical services, educational activities, and essential donations to communities in need.

On February 19, the medical mission began with a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the newly established CL Pasco IT Learning Center & Library Room, a generous donation from the Pasco family at Valencia Adventist Elementary School, Valencia City, Bukidnon. The library was enriched with ten copies of "Nature's Touch" books. Additionally, 212 students received essential items such as water containers, hand fans, and chocolates, courtesy of donors like Advent Mission Foundation and Adventist Health White Memorial CV Holding & Cath Lab.



On February 20, the AWESNA Medical Mission served over 2,000 individuals who benefitted from an array of free healthcare services held at the Valencia City Gymnasium. The mission provided medical consultations and medications; dental extractions, minor surgeries, and circumcision; laboratory testing (Lipid Panel, Glucose, HgbA1C, Thyroid Panel); 12-Lead EKG and Pap Smear screenings; chiropractic therapy and deep tissue massage; haircuts, spiritual care, and educational activities with giveaways.

The large-scale humanitarian services was made possible by the dedication of volunteers and the support of local partner organizations.

On February 21, the mission extended its outreach to the Manobo

Tribe at Banlag, Valencia City, Bukidnon. The team also witnessed their cultural heritage with the tribe's traditional attire and customs. The team provided health lectures on personal hygiene and spiritual care, while 51 families received essential supplies, including grocery items, toiletries, and vitamins.



A special feeding program served nearly 200 adults and children, who enjoyed meals served on banana trunk plates, a traditional practice of the Manobo people. The Manabos also experienced the taste of ice cream and cake. The Manabo boys and girls were given free haircut. Sponsored by the Sandwich Ministry, led by Carissa and Constantino Totalca, the tribe were also provided 300 sandwiches.



The community outreach program extended to Sulads Deaf Literacy Center at Malaybalay, Bukidnon. "It was an emotional outreach where our hearts were touched by the talents and enthusiasm of the deaf impaired children," Esther Liongco-Ong expressed. "This is one of the most emotional gift giving we have attended! I was crying with the teachers when they reached their goals and more to attend the Pathfinders Camporee," Carissa Totalca shared. The AWESNA

volunteers raised almost Php 65,000 after their performance to aid financial support to students attending for the SSD Pathfinder Camporee at Mountain View College. Donors such as Roselle de Guzman, Kristine Kim, and the Advent Mission Foundation contributed for the gifts to the deaf students.
