



### **AUP Celebrates God's Faithfulness Through Zahari 2025**

The Lord has remembered as the Adventist University of the Philippines (AUP) held its 141st Graduation Exercises from May 30 to June 1, 2025, at the Philippine International Church. More than a ceremonial graduation series, Consecration, Baccalaureate, and Commencement, served as a spiritual and academic celebration of God's faithfulness to the 583 graduating students.

The graduating class, bearing the name



Zahari (from the Hebrew word zakar, meaning "to remember"), directly translating to "the Lord has remembered." Among the 583 graduates were 508 from the Philippines and 75 international students from countries such as China, Indonesia, Rwanda, the United States, Ghana, Myanmar, Korea, and more. The graduates included 2 Associate, 454 Bachelor, 107 Master's, and 20 Doctoral degree holders across the University's eight colleges: Arts and Humanities (88), Business (114), Dentistry (31), Education (40), Health (145), Nursing (113), Science and Technology (28), and Theology (24).

### Consecration Ceremony: "God Remembers"

The commencement weekend began on May 30 with a Consecration Ceremony, a spiritual tradition in AUP that dedicates

graduating students to God's purpose. Dr. Remwill Tornalejo, president of Mountain View College, delivered the keynote message, drawing from Isaiah 49:15–16, emphasizing that "God said, 'I will never forget you. Behold, I have engraved you on the palms of My hands." He reminded the graduates that even in moments of discouragement, uncertainty, or obscurity, divine remembrance anchors their worth and direction.

A responsive reading led by Dr. Ele Lunzaga titled "Zahari Remembered by God," and the traditional candle lighting ceremony, symbolizing the light of God shining in and through the graduates, was led by Class Pastor Erick Joshua Olivares. These moments framed the graduates' journey not merely as academic but as a spiritual calling. "The candle lighting ceremony has been a long

held tradition of our dear University, but tonight, it is more than just a tradition, rather it is a promise, it is a reminder, it is a symbol of hope, and as our batch song beautifully declares, moments such as this, we're reminded of the goodness of the Lord and how He opened doors."



Class Secretary Shekinah Joy Famaran, in her response and token of appreciation, captured the sentiment of her peers: gratitude not only for the knowledge gained but for the spiritual nurture received at AUP.

"There were tears that were shed, trials that were encountered...but the light shines on," echoed Olivares during the lighting ceremony, reflecting the resilience of the class.

### Baccalaureate Service: "Called to Remember and Go Forward"

On May 31, the baccalaureate service deepened the weekend's theme with a message from Pastor Roger Caderma, president of the Southern-Asia Pacific Division. Emphasizing divine memory, he declared, "You can find all the stories that they were being forgotten, but the Lord has remembered them."



His words urged graduates to view struggles not as hindrances but as stepping stones to growth. "Use your struggles as a source of strength... Have faith that the path laid out for you is meaningful, even if it is not immediately apparent."

Pastor Caderma called them to live humbly, serve faithfully, and uphold Scripture as their

"ultimate standard of faith and practice." He reminded them that when they leave AUP, they carry the assurance that God remembers.



During the service, AUP also recognized Christian Service Award recipients, honoring students from multiple colleges for their commitment to selfless service, a cornerstone of Adventist education.

### Commencement Ceremony: Called to Whole-Person Excellence

The official commencement exercises on June 1 featured Dr. Julian Melgosa, associate Director of the Education Department of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, as the guest speaker. In his address titled "Take Care of Yourself", he encouraged graduates to nurture not just professional aspirations but also their mental, physical, relational, and spiritual well-being.



"True optimism is not a form of illusion...
The world can be horrible and cruel, but it can also be wonderful and abundant. Both manifestations are true," said Dr. Melgosa. He emphasized that living a balanced life rooted in gratitude, forgiveness, and faith is key to sustaining success beyond the academic setting. "Being a good professional does not prevent you from being a man or woman of faith," he affirmed, aligning perfectly with AUP's vision of producing competent professionals who are Christ-like in character.

The awarding of degree certificates, recognition of academic honors, and the presence of families and faculty added to the joy of the moment. But beneath the applause and

smiles lay a deeper understanding: that every achievement in AUP is tied to its mission, education for eternity.



The University honored graduates for their invaluable contributions through special awards. Cutie Canasares and Ayen Tugade, graduates of the graduate studies program, were awarded the Dr. Jeimylo de Castro Research Excellence Award (READ).



Additionally, David Agustin from the Development Communication program received the Roda's Leadership Award.

Throughout the weekend, the identity of the class as Zahari was consistently honored. It served not merely as a symbolic label but as a theological anchor, a reminder that their story is remembered by God.

# **AUPA Holds 106th Graduation Ceremony: "LIORA 2025" Inspires Graduates to Shine with Purpose**

With 176 graduands, the Adventist University of the Philippines Academy (AUPA) held its 106th Graduation Exercises at the Philippine International Church on May 18, 2025. The batch named "Liora," derived from the Hebrew word meaning "light," culminated their years of hard work, commissioning to live with purpose and conviction, carrying the light as they continue their career journey.

The graduating class was composed of students from three academic strands: 30 from Accountancy, Business and Management, 33 from the General Academic Strand, and 113 from the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

The commencement address was delivered by Dr. Arnel Zamayla, MSU-IIT professor and director of the Fab Lab Mindanao and the Center for Artificial Intelligence Research. He challenged the graduates with three powerful questions: "What is the prize?", "What is your why?", and "Who will you enlighten?" In a world filled with noise and distraction, Dr. Zamayla urged the graduates to stay grounded in their identity in Christ. "You may see yourself a sinner, a nobody, an outsider... but always remember who you are. The fight has always been about you and where your attention is." He empowered the graduands that their definition of own self should

not come from society's version or even from one's insecurities, but from how God sees each individual. He emphasized that talent and motivation must be rooted in faith to bring lasting impact. He called them to live as lights in the world, radiating truth, purpose, and grace.

The event featured the formal confirmation and declaration of graduates by Dr. Arceli Rosario, AUP president. "Carry with you faith in God because that is your sure anchor and that will protect you from all trials in life."

Following the address, graduates received their diplomas and awards, marking the academic excellence and dedication they demonstrated throughout their senior high journey.

"LIORA 2025" was more than just a graduation but a heartfelt commissioning. As the graduates move on to higher education and new life chapters, they carry with them the call to shine the light of Christ—in their homes, communities, and wherever God leads them next.

## Sausa Tops PNLE, AUP-CON Shines 100% PNLE Passing Rate for First-Takers, Ranks Among Top 5 Nationwide



ndeed, "unto God are our eyes," as the AUP College of Nursing (CON) credited another milestone to faith, academic rigor, and God's sustaining grace in the recent May 2025 Philippine Nurse Licensure Examination (PNLE). All 54 passers from Batch Elioenai successfully passed the exam, achieving an excellent 100% passing rate for first-time takers and an impressive 98.25% overall performance, placing AUP among the Top 5 Performing Nursing Schools nationwide.

Further illuminating this milestone, Julia Leri Mari Parulan Sausa secured 7th place in the national rankings.

"There's no secret—God did it! It was never about me," Sausa shared. "No amount of effort, studying, or struggling could ever make me deserving of what I received today. It is purely and entirely by God's grace."

Reflecting on her journey, she shared her prayer to continuously humble herself during the review season. "I remember during one of our pre-board exams, I prayed, 'Lord, I barely know the answers to these questions. So if I pass, it's all You.' Indeed, God is so faithful."

While waiting for the board exam results, she recalled how she surrendered everything to God. "I simply prayed, 'May Your will be done, not mine.' I knew that whatever the outcome, His plans would always be greater than mine."

"My mother told me I placed 7th; I broke down in tears. It wasn't about my strength or intellect. It was His grace that put me there. God gave me more than I imagined—for His glory, not mine," she testified how her prayers were answered. "I will never forget that this achievement is not mine alone; it is a testament to what happens when you surrender fully to God's will and trust in His perfect timing."

Throughout the visit, the KMC team facilitated presentations, open discussions, and knowledge-sharing sessions focusing on academic publishing, strategic communication, intellectual property rights, and



technology transfer systems. The sessions emphasized the importance of safeguarding students' rights in research and publication, highlighting tools such as the Mentee Consent/Attestation Form, a vital measure to ensure ethical acknowledgment of student contributions and IP applications.

The exchange provided the AUP delegation valuable insights into how well-structured knowledge management systems can promote academic integrity, operational efficiency, and innovation within the university setting.

CvSU's Knowledge Management Center likewise expressed its appreciation for the opportunity to host the benchmarking visit and conveyed openness to future collaborations aimed at enhancing academic excellence and innovation across institutions.

This benchmarking activity marks a continuing effort by AUP's Development Communication Department to provide experiential learning opportunities that equip students with practical knowledge and a broader perspective on institutional communication and knowledge systems.

### Neriah Batch Embraces the Divine Calling of Holistic Nursing at CON Pinning and Dedication Ceremony

The College of Nursing held its pinning and dedication program at the Philippine International Church on May 28, 2025. With the theme "Neriah: Nurses who Exemplify, Reform, Inspire All to be Holistic," the event honored not only the academic journey of the graduating class but their deeper commitment to a life of service under God's leading.

The term "Neriah," meaning "God is my Light," served as both an identity and a mission for the future nurses who were reminded that nursing is more than a profession—it is a divine calling rooted in faith, compassion, and a holistic approach to care. This perspective is the cornerstone of Adventist education, which seeks to mold not just competent professionals but Christ-centered individuals who live out their calling with integrity and spiritual clarity.

Drawing from biblical truths, Pastor Jose P. Orbe Jr., communication director and public affairs and religious liberty director of the Southern Luzon Philippine Union Mission expounded on the significance of making God one's Light, encapsulating it with five attributes:

- Leader Guiding each step with divine direction (Psalm 23:2).
- Illuminator Providing clarity in both clinical and emotional moments (Psalm 119:105).
- Guardian Offering strength and protection amidst fear and challenges (Psalm 27:1).
- Healer Extending healing not just through hands, but through presence, words, and prayer (Malachi 4:2).
- Teacher Continuously shaping the nurse as a disciple of compassion and

truth (Psalm 27:11).

He challenged the graduates with soul-searching questions, "Who is God in my career? Who is God in my profession?" His message reminded everyone that healing extends beyond treatment. Healing includes ministry, emotional presence, and being conduits of God's light.

In heartfelt messages, students expressed deep gratitude for the sacrifices and guidance that brought by parents, sponsors, and clinical instructors. "Your love, your sacrifices, your steady presence in the background, they carried us through more than words can ever express," Samantha Cometa stated in her tribute to parents and sponsors.

"It took an army of CI's to raise us 105 com-

petent future nurses," Prsnigarbha Dasi Potian added representing the class in honoring the clinical instructors.

Their sentiments were matched with emotional responses from faculty. "You became part of my life, my source of inspiration....You are the light the world needs," Dr. Angel Grace Bingcang, Level 3 chair, expressed. Dr. Carmela G.
